



Title: Backyard Birds

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Recommended Grade Level(s): 4th - 6th grade

Topic(s) (Tags):

Birds, State Bird, Realism, Painting, Blending colors, oil pastels

Objective:

To create a realistic bird artwork, students will look at a variety of images and focus on blending colors with oil pastels. Students will also learn how to achieve a blurred background effect with watercolor paints. Once complete each one is a unique masterpiece.

This lesson could also be a cross curricular tie with social studies, by learning about different state or national birds.



Standard/Concept

Students will be able to:

- Create a realistic bird drawing based on observation
- Use oil pastels to blend colors
- Explore how to use watercolor paints to create a blurred effect
- Examine the works by Charley Harper and John James Audubon
- **Optional:** Identify state/national bird

Materials

- High-quality, 8X10 white paper (Free from Art to Remember)
- Watercolor paints
- Paintbrush
- Water Cup
- Pencil
- Oil Pastels
- Bird Images

Breakdown

Day	Direction
1	<p><u>Choosing and Drawing bird image</u></p> <p>Birds have often been a subject of fascination. In fact, birdwatching generates \$41 billion annually in the United States. So it is no surprise that birds make a great subject in art as well. Artists like John James Audubon and Charley Harper both drew art featuring birds.</p> <p>After exploring a variety of bird images we will use basic shapes to draw a bird of choice. Then by observing images, add specific details to the bird and the background.</p>
2.	<p><u>Color with Oil Pastels</u></p> <p>By looking at bird images students color birds drawing with oil pastels. Press hard with oil pastels, leaving no white spots. Start with the lightest color to darkest color - back last or it tends to smear. Also white can be used to help blend colors together.</p>
3	<p><u>Final Details and Outline</u></p> <p>Once the bird is colored, use black to outline the bird, use black lightly.</p> <p>For the background only color things like branches, leaves or cover pencil lines do not color in the entire background, it will be painted later.</p>
4	<p><u>Painting Blurred Background</u></p> <p>To create a background use a wet on wet watercolor technique to create more of a blurred background like the photo examples.</p> <p>For wet on wet, use a brush to get paper wet with water first. Then add blobs of wet watercolor paint onto the wetten paper allowing the paint to mix together. Paint an area at a time until the entire background is filled in.</p>



Steps for the Lesson

Step	Directions	Image
1	<p>Students will <u>DRAW</u> a bird with pencil. Focusing on basic shapes, like oval or football shape.</p> <p>Teacher will provide a bird drawing handout and additional bird images to use as a reference.</p>	
2	<p>Students will use oil pastels to blend colors to create a realistic bird image and color in any background details .</p>	
3	<p>Students will use black oil pastels to create an outline of bird art.</p>	
4	<p>Teachers will demonstrate how to use the wet-on-wet watercolor technique to paint the background.</p> <p>Using the wet-on-wet watercolor technique, students will get the paper wet 1st then add blobs of wet watercolor on top</p>
